

Dear Friends,

A very Happy New Year! I hope you all enjoy good health and many blessings over the whole of 2019.



As many of you know, I worked for thirty-seven years as an Industrial Chemist in the dyestuffs industry. During the whole of that time, I only worked for one company at one site in Clayton – albeit in several different buildings within the complex. It is an absolute fact, though, that all the buildings I worked in closed down and were, in turn, demolished, because they were either unfit for purpose or market forces came into being. As a company, we could no longer produce dyestuffs at an economic level.

I am delighted to say that my current place of employment will not now suffer the same fate, since St. George's has been awarded the magnificent sum of £233,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund to carry out much needed repairs to the remainder of the roof. We received a very generous grant from the Listed Places of Worship Scheme around three years ago to repair the south side of the roof, and now we have the resources to complete the task. We are indebted to Alan Smith who has worked tirelessly to bring us to this point, completing the endless forms, co-ordinating meetings between the Architect, Heritage Lottery Fund, Contractors and our own small group from church with good humour and great efficiency. Thank you, Alan.

Although we need to preserve the building and our heritage, the church, of course, is the people of God and not the buildings. We are so very fortunate at our church to have the resources in the form of willing and gifted people who give of their time and talents week in and week out.

Our Reader-in-Training Gail has many new ideas for how we can develop our Mission Action Plan and take the love of God out into the community. For twenty-five years, we have had a Pastoral Care Team (Care Bears) who have visited members of our church who are no longer able to worship here week by week. It is our hope that the visiting scheme will be extended to include those of other faiths and none who need a friendly ear and a little company and maybe assistance in some way.

In order to accomplish this, we need people. Volunteers who are willing to give a few hours a week – a month – or maybe only occasionally in order to help someone else. A meeting has been scheduled for Monday 14<sup>th</sup> January at 7.00p.m. where the ideas for moving forward will be shared and explained in more detail. I hope that many of you will feel called to come along and listen to what is envisaged.

2019 will be a year of exciting change at St. George's as we look forward to a new incumbent who will have vision, enthusiasm and fresh ideas of taking our church forward and building on the work already achieved. Whoever takes on the task will need your help and I am certain that you will give it as you have unfailingly given it to me.

### Saint of the Month 12 January, Aelred of Hexham, Abbot of Rievaulx, 1167

Aelred was born at Hexham in Northumberland in 1109, the son and grandson of married priests (at a time when clerical celibacy was not universally practised in the Catholic Church). At an early age he was sent to the Scottish court for an education that

would ensure his future as a noble and courtier. Here he acted as a page to the young Prince Henry. King David of Scotland saw Aelred's potential, promoted him in the royal household and, it is speculated, may already have had the intention of making him a bishop.

But at the age of 24 Aelred turned his back on the opportunities that awaited him at court and entered the religious life in the newlyfounded Cistercian abbey at Rievaulx in Yorkshire. Soon he was appointed master of novices, and gained a reputation for the quality of the pastoral care he exercised to those under his charge. In 1143, when a new Cistercian abbey was founded at Revesby in Lincolnshire, Aelred was sent from Rievaulx to be the first abbot.

He did not remain at Revesby for long, however, for in 1146 the Abbot of Rievaulx died and Aelred was elected abbot. He now found himself not just the superior of a community of 300 monks, but the head of the Cistercian order in England. His new responsibilities+saw++ him travelling widely both in England and Scotland and also on the Continent – an ordeal for him as he suffered from a painful kidney complaint. But his influence was considerable and he is said to have been instrumental in persuading Henry II to attend a meeting with the Pope and King Louis VII of France in 1162. The following year he was present at Westminster Abbey, when Edward the Confessor's bones were re-interred there, and was inspired to write a biography of Edward.

Aelred's writings reveal a person of love and humanity who deeply valued, and encouraged among his monks, the cultivation of friendship, both with one another and with God.<sup>+</sup>His<sup>+</sup>two<sup>+</sup> best-khown works were *On Spiritual Friendship* and the *Mirror of Charity*. His writings and sermons (he left a considerable collection) indicated a love of Christ as Saviour and friend that was clearly the foundation of his faith and life. Aelred's writings constantly appealed to Scripture as his source of authority. His remarkable writings earned for him the epithet of 'the English St Bernard'.
