

Dear All,

For three days, at the end of June, and together with most of the full-time clergy in Manchester Diocese, I attended the Diocesan Clergy Conference at Swanwick in Derbyshire.



The theme of the Conference was 'Church for a Different World'. The Speakers were Professor David Ford – the Regius Professor of Divinity at the University of Cambridge and Lorretta Minghella – the CEO of Christian Aid and who, during the Conference, was announced to be the next First Church Estates Commissioner, one of the most senior lay people in the Church of England.

Both David and Lorretta helped us to focus on ways of being the Church in a Different World, although at the end of it, just like Pooh Bear – a bear of very little brain – my brain, too, was hurting! Take a look at their entries in Wikipedia etc. and you'll see what I mean!!

David helped us to look at various passages in John's Gospel and one thing that stuck in my mind, was that John's Gospel is a book of signs. Indeed John himself describes it as such. Jesus went about healing the sick, raising people from the dead, turning water into wine, etc and told us to do likewise. We may be able to heal the sick, but perhaps we may have more difficulty in raising the dead and turning water into wine. Yet the one sign he gave and commanded us to do, was to wash the feet of others — basically to look out for them and serve them in whatever way we can.

Lorretta told us about the poverty which faces so many people in the world, and by the end of the first session, I thought, and I'm sure I wasn't alone in thinking it, how on earth can we rid the world of such poverty? And it isn't just poverty from lack of money, but poverty in spirit, friends, health, generosity and justice, for example. Her second session told us how we can help – by giving, by helping with Christian Aid Week and by helping out, even in this country as well as worldwide. It isn't so much a daunting task when it's looked at it this way.

There were group sessions – some of which were as a Deanery Group. We were asked to set out our vision for a 'growing, worshipping and transformative Christian presence in every community'. We looked at:

How can we reorganise ourselves to be more resilient for the future?

How do we contribute to making the gospel message plausible and attractive?

What has to change so our churches/congregations are reconnecting more with our local communities and they with us?

What vision do we have of how churches in the Ashton Deanery will be in 10 years time?

What, realistically, would a flourishing church look like?

I wonder what your answers would be? If you have some, or any, then please let me know.

It was quite intensive, though there was a little space on the Tuesday afternoon for something a bit more relaxing. Of the various options on offer, I chose to visit some Well Dressings – Derbyshire is famous for these – and I along with two colleagues visited the wells at Rowsley, Youlgrave and Over Haddon.

We came away with a feeling of being more connected and a deeper sense of our calling to minister to all people.



All in the month of August

It was:

400 years ago: on 23rd Aug 1617 that the world's first one-way streets were introduced – in London.

90 years ago: on 13th Aug 1927 that the BBC took over the running of The Proms in London. The Proms were also broadcast on the radio for the first time.

75 years ago: from 23 Aug 1942 to 2 Feb 1943 that the Battle of Stalingrad took place.

70 years ago: on 14th Aug 1947 that Pakistan gained its independence from the UK.

Also 70 years ago: on 22nd Aug (to 11th Sep) that the first Edinburgh Festival was held in Scotland.

65 years ago: on 15th Aug 1952 that the Lynmouth flood in Devon occurred. 34 people were killed and buildings and bridges devastated as a flood swept through the village.

60 years ago: on 2nd Aug 1957 that the Lovell Telescope at Jodrell Bank Observatory in Cheshire began operating.

50 years ago: on 18th Aug 1967 that the city of Long Beach California purchased the RMS Queen Mary after it was retired from service.

40 years ago: on 16th Aug 1977 that Elvis Presley, 'The King', iconic American rock and roll singer, guitarist and actor, died.



Also 30 years ago: on 19th Aug 1987 that the Hungerford Massacre took place in Berkshire.



Saint of the Month 5 August Oswald, King of Northumbria, Martyr, 642

Oswald was King of Northumbria from 634 to 642 and was one of the first Christian kings in England. The son of King Ethelfrith of Northumbria, Oswald was forced to flee to Scotland when the rival king, Edwin, seized the Northumbrian Kingdom following the death

of Ethelfrith in 616. Whilst living in exile in Scotland, Oswald was converted to Christianity through the monks of St Columba. He spent some time at the monastery of Iona which had been established by Columba about 563, and returned to Northumbria to claim his crown when Edwin died in 633.

To establish his kingdom Oswald was forced to fight the Welsh king, Cadwallon. Before entering battle Oswald erected a wooden cross on the battlefield and ordered his soldiers to pray. He was successful in the fight and the field was named Heavensfield.

After securing his kingdom, Oswald sought to establish Christianity in Northumbria. He sent to Iona for missionaries. The initial response of the community at Iona was to send a bishop who by reputation was severe in character and who met with little success. When he returned, discouraged, the community sent a monk called Aidan, who was known as a gentle character, to work in the region.

Oswald gave Aidan great support. In his first journey through the region Oswald acted as interpreter. The presence of the king can only have aided the work of Aidan in spreading the Christian message as, together with a small group of colleagues, Aidan, began, establishing churches. Eventually Oswald gave Aidan and his colleagues the island of Lindisfarne as a monastic base.

After eight years as King of Northumbria, Oswald was killed in battle by Penda of Mercia, who followed the ways of paganism, and who sacrificially mutilated Oswald's body, dispatching it to different parts of his kingdom. Oswald was 38 when he died. He had united Northumbria, both politically and in terms of faith, and is recognized as one of England's foremost Anglo-Saxon Christian kings.

Bede records that

As soon as he became King, Oswald greatly wished that all the people whom he ruled should be imbued with the grace of the Christian faith, of which he had received such signal proof in his victory over the heathen.

Bede: Ecclesiastical History, III.3
