

The Transfiguration – seeing Jesus as He is

The title of Bob Geldof's autobiography, 'Is That It?', will resonate with us, when we're looking for more in life. On a deeper level, we want to see and hear more clearly what God is doing in our circumstances. Jesus' transfiguration, which we remember this month, helps us to consider this (Luke 9:28-36).

Jesus was transfigured alongside Moses and Elijah, 'As He was praying, the appearance of His face changed, and His clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning.' (29). To understand our circumstances, firstly we need to see Jesus as God wants us to see Him. The disciples' eyes were opened to see Jesus' divinity. The presence of Moses and Elijah confirmed Him as God's promised Messiah. By foreshadowing the resurrection, this event powerfully calls us to entrust our lives into Jesus' hands to experience His presence and power.

Secondly, if we are to make sense of our circumstances, we need to hear what God says about His Son. A cloud covered them and 'a voice came from the cloud, saying, 'This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to Him." (35). God affirmed His love and call on Jesus as His beloved and chosen Son. Do we hear God speaking these same words to us? When we know that we too are loved and accepted by God, this transforms our understanding of our lives.

Whatever our circumstances, they can be transformed by what we see and hear. Open your eyes to see a transfigured world. Open your ears to hear a transfiguring voice. Open your heart to become a transfigured life.

'Christians should see more clearly, because we have seen Jesus. We are people whose vision has been challenged and corrected, so that we can see the world as it properly is.' (Justin Welby).

Created for love?

Toy Story 4 is bright, colourful, funny, exciting and engaging from the opening scene to the closing credits (don't leave too early or you'll miss even more funny and poignant scenes). It is a family film in the widest possible sense of that word, with

something for everyone, whatever your age and life experiences.

Ostensibly it follows the familiar simple story arc of toys going missing and being rescued. But this film also delves more deeply into themes of rejection and restored hope. From Gabby Gabby, a doll who was discarded because of her disability, to Duke Caboom who was unwanted because he didn't live up to the media image, the film explores what it feels like to be devalued and rejected. These mini storylines are resolved as the toys find a restored hope. Gabby Gabby develops empathy for a lost child and, in turn, finds the total acceptance she sought. Duke Caboom develops a renewed confidence in his abilities and rediscovers the value he had lost.

Most significantly, wrapped around these many short stories is the overall narrative of Forky, a toy created out of rubbish by a little girl who needed a friend. In contrast to the others, Forky is not rejected by others, but by himself. "I'm not a toy", "I'm trash" he says as he repeatedly throws himself into rubbish bins. How is that story resolved? By Forky discovering that he is unique and beautiful in his own way, because his



value does not come from what others think of him, or even what he thinks of himself, but from the fact that he was created for a purpose and is loved by his creator.

At a time in our culture when many are struggling to find a sense of self-worth, perhaps there is much we can all

learn from Forky's journey of self-discovery.

Saint of the Month 9 August Mary Sumner Founder of the Mothers' Union, 1921

Mary Heywood was born in 1828 at Swinton near Manchester. The family moved to Hope End in Herefordshire and

Mary was educated at home by her parents. In 1848, she married a young curate, George Sumner, son of the Bishop of Winchester.

In 1851 George became Rector of Old Alresford in Hampshire. For many years busy bringing up her three children, Mary became more and more concerned about family life and the fact that mothers received no particular support from the Church. In 1876 she began holding 'Mothers' Union' meetings in the parish, aiming to unite mothers of all social classes in bringing up their children in the Christian faith. Baptism and parental example were its two basic principles. At first a purely parochial organization, it eventually grew into an international concern, encouraging the ideal of a Christian home. This process began in 1885 when Mary made a speech at a conference in Portsmouth which gave rise to the Mothers' Union as a national organization. It enjoyed remarkable and rapid growth and in time grew from an organization in one parish to a world-wide society, today with over one million members, committed to supporting the family and based on five objects:

- 1. To uphold Christ's teaching on the nature of marriage and to promote its wider understanding;
- 2. To encourage parents to bring up their children in the faith and life of the Church;
- 3. To maintain a world-wide fellowship of Christians united in prayer, worship and service;
- 4. To promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children;
- 5. To help those whose family life has met with adversity.

Mary Sumner died in Winchester in 1921.

Mary Sumner's Prayer:

O Lord, fill us with thy Holy Spirit, that we may firmly believe in Jesus Christ, and love him with all our hearts. Wash our souls in his precious blood. Make us to hate sin and to be holy in thought, word and deed. Help us to be faithful wives and loving mothers. Bless us and all who belong to the Mothers' Union; unite us in love and prayer and teach us to train our children for heaven. Pour out thy Holy Spirit on our husbands and children. Make our homes, homes of peace and love and, may we so live on earth, that we may live with thee for ever in heaven; for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.







Going to Uni this autumn? —— Or not?

This month thousands of school leavers will be anticipating with excitement the prospect of going on in October to what they insist on calling 'Uni'. School is over, exams have

been taken, required grades achieved, courses chosen and now the promised land of fun and freedom and a bit of study lies ahead.

But among them is a minority who, unknown to parents or even themselves, are anxious about it all. Will I settle into a new environment? Will I make friends? Or will I desperately fail my parents and family? Do I really want this?

By the end of the first year most students have come to terms with the highly individual nature of university life. Some will find adjusting difficult. Isolation and loneliness, as we all know, are extremely stressful. If the problems persist then professional help should be sought, perhaps through the university Student Health Team. Unrecognised, or hidden, this anxiety can have serious consequences.

What can parents and family do to identify and help those potentially isolated students? We can make ourselves available on the phone or internet – a familiar voice in a new setting. We can pray for them. We can make sure, on their home visits, that they actually talk about their new life – study, friends and leisure.

Answers may not come readily, but there is one point you can make that helps to put anxieties into perspective. If they have discovered that university life is not for them let them know that they can leave. They have a choice! Many are reluctant to do this because they are aware that parents have largely financed their education, and they have let them down. Assure them that is not so – love is not like that. If 'Uni' is not for them sit down together and look at the options. There is plenty of life outside of Uni!

Children are a great comfort in your old age – and they help you to reach it faster, too!

Preventing a holiday break-in

Going on holiday this month? Here is a quick check-list before you go 1. Make sure all your doors, windows, sheds and garage are securely locked (with no neighbour's cats inside).



2. Make your home look occupied – mow the lawn before you go, leave a spare key with a neighbour who will pop in to turn on lights, close and open curtains, etc.

3. If you are taking your car, ask a neighbour if they would park on your driveway.

4. Make sure your home address is not visible on your luggage, especially if you are flying off somewhere.

5. If you need a taxi, ask your neighbour if you can be collected from outside their house, (which is obviously occupied) and not your own. Taxi drivers have been known to take people to the airport, and then return and burgle their homes!

6. Unplug everything you can, and make sure the water is not leaking anywhere.

7. Check your insurance policies are up to date and have adequate cover.

8. Leave your contact details with a neighbour.
