



Friends

It's that time of year when the shops are full of pumpkins and youngsters are knocking on our doors to 'trick or treat'. How should Christians respond to Halloween? Is it simply a fun festival for the children or does it have a dark side that we should avoid?

Firstly, Christians should not respond to Halloween with *superstition*. The Bible reminds us that evil is a real force at work in our world, as *'the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour'* (1 Peter 5:8). We shouldn't underestimate his ability to blind the minds of unbelievers to the reality of spiritual warfare. (2 Corinthians 4:4).

Secondly, we can respond with *confidence*. While people are often fearful of witches, ghosts, and evil spirits, we mustn't forget that God is in control, not Satan. Jesus has secured the victory over sin and evil on the cross: *'having disarmed the powers and authorities, He made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them by the cross.'* (Colossians 2:15).

Finally, we can also offer *hope*. *'Christ died and returned to life* so that He might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.' (Romans 14:9). Halloween is an opportunity to share the hope of the gospel. For example, if we offer sweets to children calling to trick and treat, we might include information about the Christian faith or church. Or we could organise an alternative Light Party, celebrating Jesus as the light of the world.

C S Lewis provides a helpful balance for us: 'There are two equal and opposite errors into which our race can fall into about devils. One is to disbelieve in their existence. The other is to believe, and to feel an excessive and unhealthy interest in them.' (The Screwtape Letters).

Saint of the Month Edward the confessor, King of England, 1066

Born at Islip some time in the period 1002–1004, the son of Ethelred II (the 'Unready'), Edward was sent to Normandy in 1013 to be educated at the court of Duke Richard of Normandy, his uncle. Three years later, in 1016, his father lost his throne to the Danes and fled to Normandy himself. The Danish kings Sweyn, Canute and

Harthacanute showed every sign of establishing a dynasty in England and the rest of Edward's life could have been spent in the vain pursuit of noble pleasures. But the unexpected death of Harthacanute in 1042 found Edward acclaimed as king and he began his reign by marrying the daughter of the powerful Saxon Earl Godwin.

In many ways Edward's death in 1066 is both more interesting and certainly more well-known than his life. The fact that he had, at different times, promised the succession to the throne to two different people – Harold Godwinson and William of Normandy – set the stage for an epic confrontation, the most famous battle in English history, and a transformation of England's future.

Less than a century after Edward's death he was canonized by Pope Alexander III in 1161.What were the grounds for this? Edward had a general reputation for both religious devotion and for generosity to the poor and sick, but canonization required greater evidence of supposed saintliness. First was his supposed chastity. The fact that he and Queen Edith were childless led to the stories that the marriage was unconsummated and the growth of a legend that he had taken a vow of chastity. Second was the rather better attested fact that Edward was the first known king to touch for the healing of scrofula – the 'King's Evil' – a tradition continued by English monarchs until Queen Anne. Third, a vow Edward really did take was to make a pilgrimage to St Peter's tomb at Rome. But the political situation made this inexpedient and the Pope commuted the vow into the building of a monastery dedicated to St Peter. Thus began the building of Westminster Abbey, which has been a focus of national devotion ever since. In fact Edward was too sick to attend the Abbey's consecration, which took place the week before his death. A fourth factor in his canonization was the number of miracles he allegedly performed after his death. When Thomas Becket translated Edward's body to the Abbey in 1163 it was claimed to have been undecayed.

Some people are born great, some achieve greatness, and sadly, some just grate. *Anon*





The Ven John Barton reflects on just what we do give to God... this article began in the September issue, and concludes this month.

All things come from You, and of Your own do we ... not give back much!

Jesus taught a great deal about money and its dangers. Most of His parables concerned money in one form or another. He used the word 'Mammon' to describe a false financial god, saying "You can't serve God and Mammon."

So, a right attitude to money is essential for Christians.

Until we are released from the straitjacket of putting money before God, that blocked soul-artery will impede our way to God.

Once we are liberated from the control money has over us, we can be lavish in our giving – with a sense of exuberance. St Paul puts it like this: "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

St Paul spent ten years raising funds for the impoverished Church in Jerusalem where there was a serious famine. The little and very poor Church in Macedonia gave way beyond their comfort zone. The relatively wealthy Church in Corinth gave little by comparison. Paul contrasts them. Miserable Corinthians; joyful Macedonians.

Giving is fun.

Christian giving becomes something that we share privately with Jesus. In Matthew Jesus taught that when we give, we should not let even our left hand know what our right hand is doing.

God is generous to us, so when we are generous, we share a secret with Him. "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that you by His poverty might become rich."

So - giving money away makes you happy!

Giving to God is giving back what He has already given to us. It's not the quantity, it's the percentage of what we have. A right attitude to money is vital for Christians.

All in the month of OCTOBER

It was:

150 years ago, on 2nd Oct 1869 that Mahatma Gandhi, Indian activist, was born. He led the Indian independence movement against British rule.

Also 150 years ago, on 16th Oct 1869 that Girton College (now part of Cambridge University) was established as one of England's first residential colleges for women. It became part of Cambridge University in 1948, and co-educational in 1976.

100 years ago, on 7th Oct 1919 that the Dutch airline KLM was established. It is the world's oldest existing airline.

90 years ago, on 29th Oct 1929 that the Wall Street Crash took place. Also known as Black Tuesday, it led to the Great Depression in the USA.

80 years ago, on 16th Oct 1939 that the German Luftwaffe carried out its first aerial attack on British territory, bombing ships in the Firth of Forth, Scotland.

75 years ago, on 30th Oct 1944 that Jewish diarist Anne Frank and her sister Margo were transported from Auschwitz concentration camp to Bergen-Belsen. They died there, probably from typhus, in February or March 1945.

60 years ago, on 7th Oct 1959 that the Soviet space probe Luna 3 sent back the first images of the far side of the Moon.

Also 60 years ago, on 8th Oct 1959 that Margaret Thatcher was elected as a Member of Parliament for the first time.

Also 60 years ago, on 11th Oct 1959 that Britain began using postcodes. Beginning in Norwich, they were rolled out city by city and town by town, covering the entire country by 1974.

50 years ago, on 5th Oct 1969 that the first episode of the comedy series Monty Python's Flying Circus was broadcast in the UK. It ran for four seasons.

30 years ago, on 19th Oct 1989 that the 'Guildford Four' were released from prison after their convictions for IRA pub bombings in 1975 were quashed by the British Court of Appeal.

25 years ago, on 13th Oct 1994 that the three main loyalist paramilitary groups in Northern Ireland announced a ceasefire following the IRA ceasefire announcement on 31st Aug.

20 years ago, on 27th Oct 1999 that Britain's House of Lords voted to end the automatic right of hereditary peers to sit and vote in the upper chamber of Parliament. Of over 700 peers, only 92 would remain, chosen by election.

15 years ago, on 29th Oct 2004 that Osama bin Laden admitted ordering the September 11th attacks on the USA, in a videotape broadcast by the al Jazeera TV network.
