# The Vicar writes...

An elderly gentleman who spent many hours in church in prayer was once asked, "what do you do when you pray?" He answered, "I don't really know — I just sit and look at God, and God looks at me."

One of the most helpful pieces of advice a member of a religious community once gave me was, "pray as you can, not as you can't." Lent is a good time to explore

our relationship with God through prayer, as individuals and as a church community. Each of our relationships with God will be different and we will find different things helpful. During Lent this year there will be an opportunity on Monday evenings 7pm-8pm (starting 3<sup>rd</sup> March) to explore prayer and different ways of praying. There will be also be a Quiet Morning on 28<sup>th</sup> March where we will use silence, music and words to create a space for God in our busy lives.

Some people find giving up or fasting from something (e.g. chocolate!) helpful in Lent, some find it more helpful to take something on (e.g. giving to the foodbank, reading the Scriptures daily). However we choose to do it, during Lent we are encouraged to grow closer to God through prayer, through fasting, through studying God's word and through acts of service. God has created, knows and loves us – our relationship with God is unique and special. We are called to pray, however we do it, and all of our prayer, even when we have no words or are at a loss, is treasured by God.

It is a privilege to meet with people and talk about where they are in their journey with God, and where God may be calling. Lent is a good time to reflect on this. If you would like to have such a conversation, do please be in touch.

As we journey through Lent we journey to the fulfilment of God's promises at Easter; new life and resurrection. God calls us to live life in all its fullness and to find fullness in God. May Lent be a time for each of us to discern how this can be so.

"You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." (St Augustine's Confessions)

With all good wishes, and every prayer for a blessed Lent.







# Real Easter Eggs celebrate their 10<sup>th</sup> birthday!

The Real Easter Egg campaign has been running since 2010 and involves thousands of churches, schools and groups. It crosses all denominations and offers individuals a simple way to share the Easter Story while supporting Fairtrade and charitable projects.

The idea began in 2008 when I was given a chocolate Easter Egg. On the side of the box it read: 'Easter is the festival of chocolate and loveliness'. I began to wonder – was it right for the manufacturer of an Easter egg to change the meaning of a religious festival in this way? Imagine the outcry if this had been done to Christmas.

I searched for an Easter egg which mentioned the Christian story of Easter. It became clear that out of the 80 million eggs on sale there was not a single manufacturer who was willing to mention the religious aspects of the festival. So, I started The Meaningful Chocolate Company to manufacture the UKs first 'Real Easter Egg'.

For it to be a 'Real Easter Egg', it had to reflect the Easter themes of hope and new life and do three things – have a copy of the Easter story in the box, be made from Fairtrade chocolate and support charitable causes.

The Real Easter Egg was launched in 2010. It was a struggle, as the supermarkets turned down the idea. It was left to churches and schools to place orders and fund the making of The Real Easter Egg.

Ten years on, more than a million eggs have been sold, with over 750,000 eggs sent through the post directly to customers. The rest have been sold through retailers and supermarkets.

Nearly £275,000 has been donated to charitable projects with Fairtrade Premium fees paid to farmers allowing them to buy everything from school-books and solar panels to providing fresh water.

The cost is £4.50 each.
