

### "New" St George's Church celebrates 180 years!!

The church has been battling for centuries to help out those in need and as we celebrate our 180<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St George's Church we take note of all the kindness that is currently needed to help those in poverty, going hungry and the homeless, particularly during this difficult time of the COVID 19 pandemic. We continue to collect for Tameside East Foodbank, recently collected Harvest gifts for the Booth Centre in Manchester to help those who are struggling as Christians have done for many centuries.

The history of St George's is far from straight forward. A chapel had been built in 1776 on Cocker Hill for people who could not reach St Michael's in Ashton. The chapel was called St George's and was not far from the Ridgehill area but the building fell down two years later. Another chapel was built in 1780 on Cocker Hill and the 'new' St George's Church was built in 1840, the church we know and love today and which was built from the stone at a local quarry. The dedication dates back to June 24th of that year. Although our new church was supposed to replace the Cocker Hill 'old' St George's, congregational rivalries stopped that from happening and both churches continued to run for over a century and into the 1960s.

At one point the new St George's attendance was very low and the church was suffering from neglect. However in 1870 a new curate, John Homer Killick, took over and not only did the congregation of adults rise reportedly from 14 to 20 to over 250, the building was repaired, some of which done by the curate's own hand. There had been talk of new St George's setting up a school for some time but one was opened in Spring Street through Killick's fundraising, a report stated, two years after he left St George's.

Our church has faced many of its own struggles. As curate Killick raised between £200 and £300 to repair St George's in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, we have recently repaired the roof of the building helped by a lottery grant. As the congregation was low at some points we have had to see our pews quietened due to the outbreak of the Covid pandemic, with churches across the nation being closed for three months, unlike any other period in history. Yet we have to remember that the Church of England has battled for years in difficult times.

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Following on from the many vicars who have gone before, Reverend Penny becoming Vicar of St George's this year so opened another new chapter in the history of 'new' St George's Church. Prayer and pastoral care and support became even more important during this harshest of times, as did new ways of reaching out and communicating to our community. We remember too, at this difficult time, all those though who need care aside from reasons to do with the pandemic and we continue to look for ways to reach out. We pray that St George's will continue to lend its kindness as it has for 180 years.

### Fancy a cosy treat? Parkin Recipe (from BBC Good Food)

### **Ingredients**

200g butter, plus extra for greasing

I large egg 4 tbsp milk 200g golden syrup 85g treacle 85g light soft brown sugar 100g medium oatmeal 250g self-raising flour

I tbsp ground ginger



### **Method**

Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3. Butter a deep 22cm square cake tin and line with baking parchment. Beat the egg and milk together with a fork.

Gently melt the syrup, treacle, sugar and butter together in a large pan until the sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat. Mix together the oatmeal, flour and ginger and stir into the syrup mixture, followed by the egg and milk.

Pour the mixture into the tin and bake for 50 mins - 1 hr until the cake feels firm and a little crusty on top. Cool in the tin then wrap in more parchment and foil.

**TIP:** Keep for up to five days before eating if you can – it'll become softer and stickier the longer you leave it, up to two weeks.

### The Diocese of Manchester Race, Inequality and Justice Group (DoMIRJ)

The Diocese of Manchester has established the Race, Inequality and Justice Group, led by the Archdeacon of Manchester, The Ven Karen Lund, with the blessing of the Bishop of Manchester, Dr David Walker, as a response to the murder of George Floyd in the USA and the subsequent demand to affirm that Black Lives Matter in this country – and in particular, in the Diocese of Manchester.

Consisting of both lay and clergy representatives, the Group has been tasked with creating a safe space to equip Christians to begin to confidently engage in the ongoing challenge of overcoming racism in their contexts.

At a recent Diocesan Synod, a motion against racism was passed. The Diocese of Manchester Race, Inequality and Justice Group prays and hopes that the successful passing of the Motion on Racism will be a catalyst for real and lasting change within the organisational life of the diocese and the wider Church. The Archdeacon of Manchester, Karen Lund said, "The problem of racism is real and we need to look both at the problem and beyond the problem in order to honour the biblical/Christ-like vision of a new heaven and the new earth consisting of all God's people."

### The Church of the Nativity, Bethlehem



The Church of the Nativity, or Basilica of the Nativity is located in Bethlehem. Inside, the Grotto of the Nativity, the place where Jesus is said to have been born, is an underground space which forms the crypt of the Church of the Nativity. The Grotto is part of a network of caves, which are accessed from the adjacent church of St Catherine. The Grotto is the oldest site continuously used as a place of Christian worship, and the Basilica is the oldest major church in the Holy Land.

The cave has an eastern niche which contains the Altar of the Nativity. The exact spot where Jesus is thought to have been born is marked beneath this altar but a 14 pointed silver star with the Latin inscription, "Hic De Virgine Maria Jesus Christus Natus Est 1717" (Here Jesus Christ was born to the Virgin Mary 1717) It was installed by Catholics in 1717, Removed in 1847 and replaced by the Turkish government in 1853.

The star is set into the marble floor and surrounded by 15 silver lamps representing the 3 Christian communities, 6 belong to the Greek Orthodox, 4 to the Catholics, and 5 to the Armenian Apostolic. The significance of the 14 points of the star is believed to represent the three sets of 14 generations in the genealogy of Jesus Christ. First 14 from Abraham to David, then 14 from David to Babylonian captivity, then 14 more to Jesus Christ. In the middle of the 14 pointed star is a circular hole though which you can reach in to touch the stone that is said the be the original stone that Mary laid on when she gave birth to Jesus. The Altar of the Magi is located directly opposite form the manger site.

Also known as Father Christmas (as he was a Bishop) or "Santa Claus" (from the Dutch Sinterklaas' meaning 'Saint Nicholas') he is a popular patron saint, including patron saint of children, sailors, ships, scholars, brides and prisoners (especially those falsely imprisoned). His feast day is celebrated by the church on 6th December.

Nicholas was a Bishop in Myra (modern day Turkey) in the 4th century. He was a kind and generous man who used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He dedicated his life to serving God first as a monk before being made Bishop.

The most famous story of Saint Nicholas is of a poor man with three daughters. He could not afford their dowries and the women were to be sold into slavery. Legend has it that on three separate occasions, bags of gold were flung into the house, landing in the girl's stockings, hung by the fireplace. This led to the custom of children hanging stockings or putting out shoes, eagerly awaiting gifts from Saint Nicholas. Sometimes the story is told with gold balls instead of bags of gold. That is why three gold balls, sometimes represented as oranges, are one of the symbols for St. Nicholas. Sometimes gifts are left in shoes.

Other legends tell of him saving 3 students who had been kidnapped and hidden in pickling tubs (1) and of him saving sailors and

hidden in pickling tubs (!) and of him saving sailors and their ships at sea through his calm prayer. This story was told about Nicholas whilst he was still alive and the sailors already claimed his as their patron saint.

The generosity and kindness of St Nicholas continues and we must all support those in poverty and need.

Why not help him out by making a donation to a children's charity on 6th December or by leaving a little gift (even an orange or some gold coins!) for someone on his feast day?

### Poppy Appeal 2020



Look out for the Poppy Appeal again this year, but not so much via street collections. Instead, the Royal British Legion will focus on contactless donations, as a safer way forward during the pandemic.

One such method will be 'point of sale donations'. This means that when you shop at your supermarket and reach the till or online, you may be invited to round up your total to the nearest pound to help the Poppy Appeal.

A spokesman for the Royal British Legion said: "The Poppy Appeal 2020 is very much still going ahead", but that "the safety and wellbeing of our volunteers, staff and members is paramount.

This means that collectors who fall into the vulnerable category have been advised "not to take part in activity on behalf of the Poppy Appeal that would expose them to any additional risks while coronavirus is still present."

And yet the need is still huge: "Members of the Armed Forces Community are suffering significant hardship as a result of the Covid-19 outbreak and we at the Royal British Legion will do everything we possibly can to support them."

Current guidance states that in tiers 1, 2, and 3, places of worship will remain open.




Up to 15 people maximum for weddings and up to 30 for funerals. Baptisms may take place in public worship or in a gathering of no more than 6.
