Behind the Scenes ... SHARING A PRIEST-IN-CHARGE WITHIN A MISSION COMMUNITY

Since Penny's departure at the end of January, our parish has been in what is termed a vacancy or interregnum - meaning a period of time 'between Vicars".

Alongside this change in our church - as you may have heard - Manchester Diocese is implementing a transformation they have named Mission Communities. Across the whole diocese, parishes are now grouped together in geographical areas. St. George's is part of Mission Community 6 which comprises the ten churches of:

St. George, Mossley
St. John, Roughtown
St. John the Evangelist, Hurst
Holy Trinity, Bardsley
St. Gabriel, Ashton
St. James, Ashton
Holy Trinity, Ashton
St. George, Stalybridge

This is partly a cost cutting exercise but it holds the hope that parishes

will work more closely together and, by learning from each other's

experiences, be better equipped to spread the news of the Gospel and become more effective missionaries.

The Diocese has specified how many stipendiary clergy they are aiming for in each of the Mission Communities and their allocation for our group is 3.5 paid priests. This seems like quite a small number for ten worship centres, but the aim is for more lay people to take leadership roles and conduct services. It is also envisaged that there will need to be flexibility with the timing and venues of worship. There will also be support from OLMs (Ordained Local Ministers), SSMs (Self Supporting Ministers), Retired Clergy, Readers and ALMs (Authorised Lay Ministers). It means the end (certainly for the foreseeable future) of the one priest to every parish church that the majority of us have been used to throughout our lives.

This reduction in clergy numbers will partly be achieved by linking some posts together when they become vacant. The plan is for there to be one paid priest to roughly every twenty thousand people.

The Diocese have informed the PCC that this is what will happen when someone new is appointed to our parish. Whoever comes will serve half-time with St. George, Stalybridge and half-time in the Parish of Mossley.

This is not a merger of the parishes into one. Each will remain individual - just as they are at the moment - with their own PCCs, Wardens, Treasurer, Officials and the like. Nothing will change in that respect. The difference is that we will share a Priest-in-Charge.

Obviously this will present some logistical challenges. As arrangements stand currently, there would be Sunday morning services in three worship centres and only one priest. However, challenges present opportunities and with God's grace we will work through them and hopefully find a pattern that enriches our worship and mission.

Have you ever wondered why the front of the altar has different colours at different times of the year? If so read on. The Revd Dr Jo White explains all!

The Meaning of Colours - part 2

Last month we looked at the changing of colours in the church's vestments and altar cloths during March, April and May this year. This month of June sees them changing again, but this time for around 20 weeks.

We start the month still in the season of Easter; strictly speaking, in the time after the Ascension. The first Sunday in June is the feast of Pentecost. This was and remains a Jewish Festival. At the time of Jesus, it was a joyful celebration of the first fruits of the Harvest, which was why all the apostles were gathered together in Jerusalem, as was expected of all Jewish men.

As they gathered following Jesus' Ascension, the Holy Spirit came upon them. This is what Christians celebrate at Pentecost, and therefore the colour is red. The following day the colour changes to green, and remains green until the 30th of October, the Feast of All Saints' which will be white.

This gives us approximately 20 weeks of 'green' with the occasional day in between of white or red to celebrate an apostle, saint or a specific feast day.

So the question is 'Why?' Why so long?

This time is often referred to as 'Ordinary' time. So what is 'ordinary' about it? I don't know about your life but mine tends to go along fairly steady with just the odd up or down time. Most of my days are 'ordinary'.

In church lectionary terms this period of 'X Sunday after Pentecost' follows one main gospel's teachings and miracles of Jesus. It's almost like He gathers us together for a summer school and takes us up a mountainside and teaches us there. It's a time for leaning and growth.

This month

Like the green grass feeds the animals, this month spend some time just looking at a patch of grass or the leaves on trees from a distance.

See the different shades and hues and when you next hear the gospel reading imagine sitting under those trees on that grass with Jesus Himself.

Celebrating the Platinum Jubilee

A special extended bank holiday weekend this month will give communities across the UK a chance to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.


In February this year, HM the Queen became the first British monarch to celebrate 70 years of service.

The weekend, from Thursday June 2nd to Sunday June 5th will include a birthday parade, beacons across the country, a 'platinum party' at Buckingham Palace, a pageant and thousands of street parties and lunches. Many churches will be holding special services and events.

A centrepiece of the celebrations will be a Service of Thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral, London, on Friday June 3rd. It's fitting that the service will form a key part of the Jubilee, as the Queen has been vocal in speaking about her Christian faith in a series of high-profile broadcasts.

Traditional images of monarchy portray power, status, and superiority over other people. In biblical times, monarchs were to be feared. When teaching His disciples about leadership, Jesus said, "The kings of the Gentiles (pagans) lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors." A benefactor was a conspicuously generous person who acted in a way that made the recipient feel obligated.

All this was in complete contrast to Christ's own style, which was to act like a servant. This radical stance was adopted by the young Princess Elizabeth, when she promised the British Commonwealth, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service ...". It was just the same when she became Queen in 1952. Queen Elizabeth has consciously and deliberately applied Christ's teaching to her reign for 70 years. She has outlived scores of leaders, some with ambitions beyond their abilities, and a few with delusions of grandeur. Her ideals have outlasted theirs. Consistent, determined, charming, and single-minded, she has held before her the model of Christ, washing His disciples' feet.



Those closest to her also speak of the Queen's sense of humour. It emerged publicly at the opening ceremony of the 2012 Olympic Games in London, when she took part in a spoof scene with James Bond, before seemingly parachuting into the Stadium.

In her Christmas Day broadcast in 2016, she said: "Jesus Christ lived obscurely for most of his life, and never travelled far. He was maligned and rejected by many, though he had done no wrong. And yet billions of people now follow his teaching and find in him the guiding light for their lives.

"I am one of them, because Christ's example helps me see the value of doing small things with great love, whoever does them and whatever they The Queen is Supreme Governor of the Church of England but her interest in faith goes well beyond this title. She holds a strong Christian faith and has exemplified

this in her lifetime of dedicated service.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

Canon Paul Hardingham praises an outstanding monarch.

This month we celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. She is the longest reigning monarch in British history. Up until recently she attended church every week and still did a full week's work at the age of 96!

What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service? In 2002 she said this: "I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God." These are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and can inspire all of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and Commonwealth to "pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life." Paul urges us to pray for all in authority, "that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." (1 Timothy 2:2).

Both Gillian and Val would really like to thank you for all the support everyone is giving us throughout the difficult period without a Vicar. We couldn't do it without you.





Father's Day 19th June Fathers come in five different types

This month brings Father's Day.

Of course, there are many kinds of fathers. In a recent study on fatherhood, they identified five types:



The *irresponsible father*, who "has literally zero involvement with his kids... they don't even know who he is."

The *ignorant father* "doesn't know anything about being a father, and he doesn't try to learn or improve."

The *inconsistent father* "is torn by personal ambition. He has the capability of doing better at this fathering thing, but instead he prioritises his own job, career, and hobbies."

The *involved father* shows up for his kids in a positive way, but "he never seeks to understand specifically who his children are, and why God gave them to him."

Finally, there is the *intentional father*. He "seeks to understand the children God has given him and wants to form them into young persons who can fulfil their purpose. He sees parenting as central to his call before God and does it with all of his might."

All these types of fathers are probably present in our own community, so how can we encourage our local fathers to make the most of their vital role?

Ultimately, our pattern of Fatherhood has to come from God. As Leith Samuel once said, "He who had always known Him as Father came to address Him as God that we who could only have known Him as God could come to address Him as Father."
