

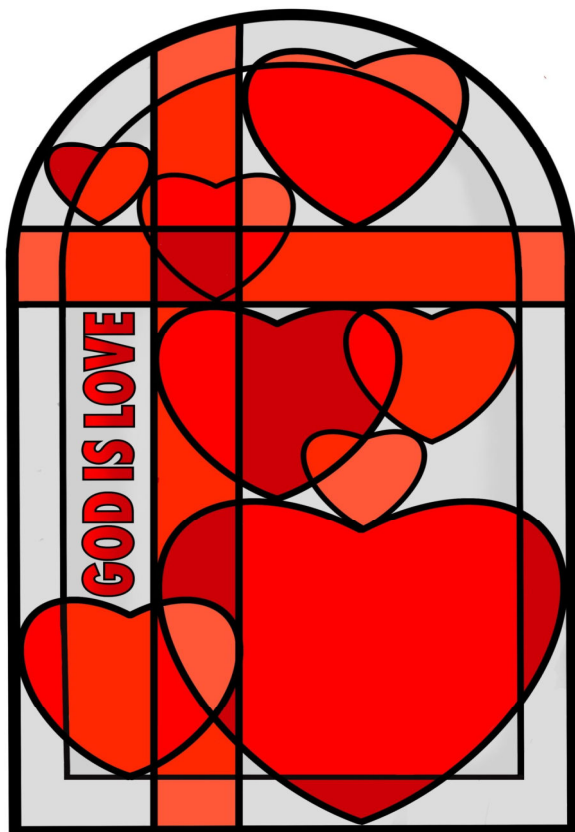

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I think every time I write I mention how quickly time passes. It is already February! And we are already looking forward to Lent which begins on 5th March with our special services for Ash Wednesday. In contrast the Church is only just coming to the end of our Christmas and Epiphany celebrations with Candlemas or The Presentation of Christ in the Temple on February 2nd. I'm constantly aware of how quickly the months and years pass. I wonder if it's the same for you.

This brings to mind one of my favourite lines from a prayer. Here it is, 'Give us the wisdom and grace to use aright that time is left to us on earth.' It comes from the funeral service and it's asking us to make sure we're making the most of our lives. 'Use aright' obviously refers to us remaining close to God and living as disciples of Christ but I also think of it as a reminder for me to do those things I most enjoy, to enjoy my life as much as I can and to create good memories. God offers joy through the Holy Spirit and God wants us to find joy in what He has given us in creation and through human creativity.

I know that many people are facing challenges because of infirmity or financial concerns, and these can be very undermining of joy and peace, but I hope even in the worst circumstances we can all find something to give thanks for and enjoy in our lives. I'm fortunate that the vicarage has a beautiful view over the valley in Mossley. It changes as the weather and seasons change and I feel very fortunate to be able to enjoy it. It's a simple pleasure but one that I'm so grateful for.

Time is a gift from God and our lives are a gift from God. The Church emphasises the sacred nature of time by interspersing the liturgical year with feasts and commemorations. Our own lives are sacred and unique. I hope we can be thankful for these simple and profound blessings today.

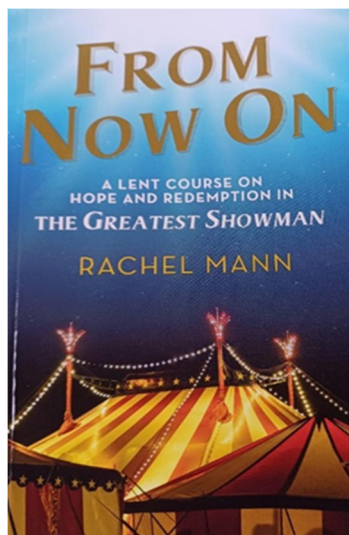

"George's Kitchen" - what we do !

"George's Kitchen" is a volunteer group based at St George's Church.

Formed during the height of the pandemic in 2021, our mission is to reach out to the most isolated, vulnerable members of our community by providing them with a free weekly home-cooked frozen meal, as well as an opportunity for a little bit of conversation on their doorstep.

Our volunteers fulfil a number of different roles ...

All our meals are cooked with reference to defined shopping lists, so we have people who undertake the weekly shop for us and deliver it to the church. Then, our cooks prepare the meals from scratch in our recently refurbished kitchen at St George's Church - typically, these cooking sessions take place on Wednesday mornings. Our volunteer cooks are ably supported by kitchen prep assistants - it really is a team effort! Then, at around noon on each Wednesday, our delivery people arrive at the church to collect the meals and distribute them to our recipients. We currently deliver about 50 meals per week to local folk in the immediate surrounding area. Anyone can claim a meal, there is no charge - we just ask that our recipients live nearby in Stalybridge; we prefer to focus on individuals who maybe find it tough getting out and about or perhaps don't have that many visitors during the week. All these roles are coordinated by another volunteer who prepares a monthly rota of tasks, so everyone knows exactly what they are doing and no-one is left unsupported in their role.

The work continues behind the scenes too, as other volunteers maintain our social media presence, prepare and review menus and fulfil other chores like labelling up the meals and preparing posters advertising our service.

This year 7557 toys were donated, £2960 raised on Just Giving and 1142 children and young people received a gift on Christmas Day.

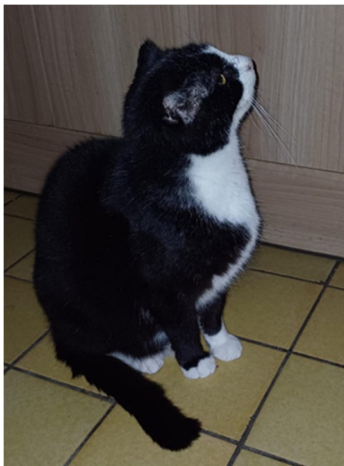

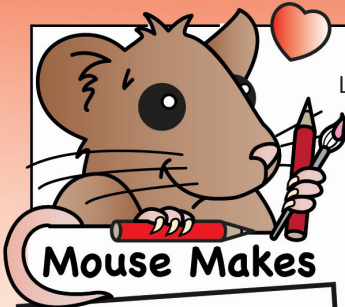

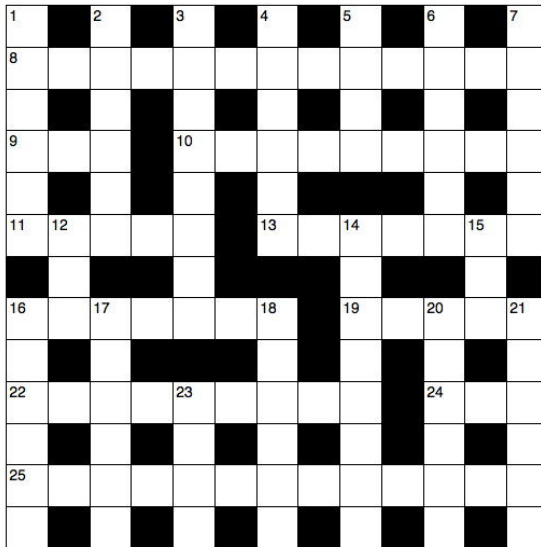

Why Do We Do That? Making the Sign of the Cross

You may have noticed that I make the sign of the cross quite often during services. There are two different ways that I use the sign of the cross. First on myself. I sign myself, head, shoulders and chest or heart, and I make a larger sign over the congregation. Some people think that as Anglicans and members of the Church of England we don't make the sign of the cross, they think it's only for Roman Catholics. Clearly, this isn't the case, but it is a personal choice.

So, why do it? Well, you may remember last time I wrote about why the dismissal at the end of the service comes from the back of church. It's a sign, a physical sign, of us being sent out into the world in the power of the Spirit. The sign of the cross is also a physical sign. It's a physical sign of the centrality of the cross in our lives. It's a sign that we carry the wonderful benefits of the cross and resurrection in our bodies; our minds (head), strength (shoulders), and heart (chest). It reflects our hope to love God with '*all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength*'. This is how I think of making the sign of the cross to myself.

The other way the sign of the cross is used is to the congregation. The two most obvious uses are during the Absolution after the Confession and during the Blessing. Again, these are physical signs. First, at the absolution it's a sign of God's forgiveness which comes through the cross and second, at the blessing it's a sign that we take God's blessing out into the world with us.

Why physical signs? Why something we can see and do rather than just hear? This is because we believe in the incarnation. We believe that God became human. God was born and became flesh. This means we have a high understanding of the physical things of creation including our bodies. We believe that our bodies are sacred and that we are part of the sacredness of God's creation, and the sign of the cross is an outward demonstration of this sacredness. It also reflects an inward spirituality based on an appreciation of Christ's sacrifice on the cross for us. We see crosses around us in church and we 'do' the cross to ourselves when we make the sign of the cross over our bodies.
