Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I've been reminded very recently of my baptism promises and how important they are to how I live my life. I wonder if you ever look back to your baptism and think about what it means to you. As a vicar, I obviously officiate at a lot of baptisms, almost all of them baptisms of very young children and babies. We can get a bit cynical about the fact that families bring their children to be 'Christened', but never or very rarely come to church again. That's not what I want to write about today. I attended an event at which we as clergy were challenged to reconsider one of the questions that is asked at a baptism. 'Do you turn to Christ?' The answer is, of course, 'I turn to Christ.' The challenge was for us, how far do we take that in our own lives?

We are expected to pray the Office daily, that is Morning and Evening Prayer which is fine, and which becomes a routine part of the day, but beyond that, how do we turn to Christ throughout the day. Are we conscious of walking or driving with God on our way to church. We do thank God as we are unlocking the church or switching the lights on and other everyday things. Do we find blessing in these simple tasks. Do we acknowledge that we are doing them for God and with God.

The big question was how much time do we spend with God in silent prayer? Do we sit down in church or in a prayer space in our vicarages and intentionally turn to Christ. Turn our hearts and minds to God. Do we think it's OK to leave phone calls and emails unanswered, sermons unwritten, desks untidied, tasks uncompleted, in order to spend 'quality' time with God. Do we sit and listen to God? Do we read scripture and expect it to be God's word for us that day? What would your answer be to any of these questions. How do you 'Turn to Christ' in your daily lives?

As for those baptism families I mentioned. Please pray for them. Pray for the children, pray for the Godparents, pray for mums and dads, and grandparents and all the rest. God loves them and longs for them to turn to Him as well.

Mission Community 6 and Deanery News

The 2023 vision for the Diocese has evolved over time, and there are now four priorities. These are: Growing Younger; Church Planting and Revitalisation; developing Missional Leaders; Parish Renewal. These were reported on by Bishop Mark at the most recent Deanery Synod.

As a Mission Community we met at St John's, Hurst at the beginning of March to discuss how we could work together. Two priorities emerged. The first was better communication. People felt that almost from the beginning of the initiative to introduce Mission Communities communication about them and between them has been poor. People are still unsure about what they are for and how they can be of benefit to churches. The second priority was to find out what is already happening in our churches and let others know. In this way if there's an interesting project which could be introduced in other churches we could find out more and perhaps visit. Some Mission Communities are much further along the path of collaboration than our Mission Community which is Mission Community 6. However, any step forward, however, small is progress and I'm sure that we will find ways of working together and bearing fruit.

Where did your Easter egg come from?

Your Easter egg can be traced back to the early Church in Mesopotamia.



Since ancient times, people had been giving each other eggs at pagan Spring festivals, as eggs were a symbol of the new life and rebirth in nature all around them. Then came Jesus and His death and resurrection, which made Easter the ultimate time for Christians to celebrate new life and rebirth. After that, it was only a matter of time before eggs found their way into commemorating Easter.

This seems to have first happened with the very early church in Mesopotamia, where those early Christians began dyeing their eggs after Easter, to celebrate the new birth that Jesus had given to them. The practise of using eggs in Easter celebrations then spread to the Orthodox Churches, and from there to the Western Churches across Europe.

This year, why not buy an extra Easter egg or two, and join our church in donating them to our local food bank? You will make some local children very happy!

Why Do we Do That?

Have you ever noticed that I always add a little splash of water to the wine in the chalice before I begin the Eucharistic Prayer? Water plays quite an important part in our Holy Communion services. This is mostly to do with cleanliness both practically and symbolically, but the water added to the wine is different. First, it

was quite usual for people to dilute wine with some water during the period when Jesus instituted Holy Communion. It was common practice for anyone when drinking wine. The second and more profound reason is that it reminds us that when Jesus was on the cross a soldier pierced his side with a spear to check that he was dead. Water came out of his side, and we remember this in the water and the wine of the chalice.

You may also notice that a small amount of water is poured onto my hands when the altar has been prepared, and the Offertory has been collected and prayed over. This also happens just before the Eucharistic Prayer, and it is a symbolic cleansing. As the water is poured, I pray a short prayer asking God to 'Create in me a clean heart and renew a right spirit within me.' In other words, I'm asking God to make me spiritually ready to preside at the Eucharist. The cleansing of my hands is an outward sign of this inward grace.

One action which is connected to this, but which you may not see is that during the Eucharistic Prayer, before I pick up the host, I run the tips of my fingers along the corporal (the square cloth that is laid under the paten and chalice.) This is also to make sure that my hands are as clean as they can be before touching the sacred elements.

Again, all of these actions are outwards signs which reflect our understanding that what we are doing during Holy Communion is sacred, a drawing closer to God and an anticipation of the heavenly banquet we will one day enjoy in His presence.

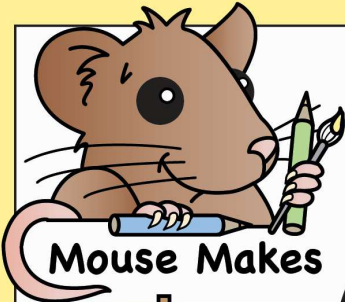
Our spring fair will soon be here and we are asking for donations for the following stalls:

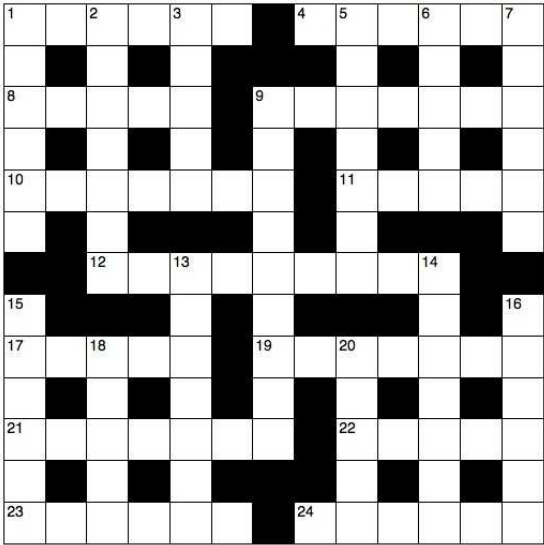
