Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Happy Easter! Yes, even though the Easter weekend is over, as you all know in the Church the season of Easter continues.

The death and resurrection of Jesus are the most important events in history, and we should remain joyful about our salvation through Christ and continue to celebrate as much as we can.

The Easter story is amazingly dramatic and involves many different people and characters, friends, enemies, ordinary people, and religious and political leaders. Inevitably we think of the disciples and all that they experienced and did after the resurrection. It's a message of life and peace, love and hope.

No wonder we celebrate for weeks and weeks after what seems to be 'the main event'. So, I say again Happy Easter. May you continue to celebrate all year around and may this wonderful season remain full of joy and hope for you and yours.

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

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### APCM

The APCM will be held on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> May – after the service. This is when we vote in new PCC members, appoint assistant wardens and wardens. Being on the PCC is great way to influence what happens in your Church, so please do consider being part of it.

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### Grave Tidy Service

While we try to keep all of the graveyard clean and tidy all year round, it is getting to that time of year when everything seems to spring up! So we offer a grave tidy and attendance service from April to October. The service is to ensure particular graves are de-weeded, well trimmed, neat and clear of leaves and twigs. We also clean the memorial. All of this is just £30 per year.



## Remembering VE Day – 80 years on

80 years ago, on 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945, VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of World War 2. It was celebrated as a public holiday, and came exactly a week after German radio announced the death in action of Adolf Hitler.

In reality, Hitler had committed suicide on 30<sup>th</sup> April. His successor, Grand Admiral Karl Dönitz, quickly negotiated an end to the war with the Allies – at the same time trying with some success to prevent as many Germans as possible from falling into Soviet hands.

Field Marshal Montgomery accepted the unconditional surrender of German forces in the Netherlands, north-west Germany and Denmark at a ceremony near Hamburg on 4<sup>th</sup> May. All German forces then surrendered to Supreme Allied Commander General Eisenhower on 7<sup>th</sup> May at Reims, France. Soviet leader Josef Stalin had his own ceremony, in Berlin.

The announcement that the war had ended in Europe was broadcast to the British people by the BBC late on 7<sup>th</sup> May. It was decreed that there would be a national holiday the next day, and the stage was set for huge celebrations. Prime Minister Churchill had been assured that there was enough beer in the capital, and commemorative items, including VE Day mugs, were quickly produced.

St Paul's Cathedral held ten consecutive services giving thanks for peace, each one attended by thousands of people, and churches throughout the country rang their bells. The Royal Family played a central role, appearing eight times on the balcony of Buckingham Palace while huge numbers of people flocked down The Mall.

In the United States, VE Day coincided with President Harry S Truman's 61st birthday: he dedicated the victory to the memory of his predecessor, Franklin D Roosevelt, who had died of a stroke less than a month earlier. But both Truman and Churchill pointed out that the war against Japan had not yet been won. That final victory was still more than three months away.

Of course, the end of a war could never be neat. In Europe the last known shots on the Eastern Front were actually fired on 11<sup>th</sup> May, and on 25<sup>th</sup> May the battle of Odžak ended in a Yugoslav Partisan victory. Tragically, in French Algeria, Muslims celebrating the end of the war (some also peacefully protesting for independence) were “inexcusably” massacred by colonial authorities and militias – leading eventually to the Algerian War nine years later.


"Oh no," Campbell replied, "I hope not – I want to win!"



## Why Do We Do That?

Have you ever wondered why we have the Peace in the middle of our services?

You may have noticed that there are a number of ways that the Peace can be introduced, all of them based on verses from Scripture. They also change according to the different liturgical seasons. It comes after the Bible readings, sermon and Intercessions, when we ‘break open the word,’ and before the Eucharistic Prayer when we ‘break open the bread and wine’. But why do we do it?

This is quite a challenging part of our worship because it should be more than greeting our church friends. It’s more about having an opportunity to be reconciled to anyone we may have an ‘issue’ with. Someone we may have been annoyed with or who may have hurt us or who we may even be in conflict with.

You can see why I said this was a challenging part of the service, being reconciled with someone and trying to mend a broken relationship is a very hard thing to do especially in the short time given to the Peace. This reminds us of St Paul’s teaching about the Eucharist. In 1 Corinthians Chapter 11 St Paul warns against receiving Holy Communion ‘in an unworthy manner’. Ideally, we prepare to receive Communion through prayer before the service and by participating as fully as we can in the worship. The Peace is another opportunity to make sure we are ready in mind and spirit to receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

We also talk about ‘sharing the Peace’. In some churches this means greeting as many people as possible with the words, ‘The peace of the Lord’, or however we choose to offer peace. In other churches ‘sharing the Peace’ is done only with those nearest to us in the pews. In this way the Peace is shared throughout the church because one person passes the Peace on to the next all the way around the church until everyone has been greeted.

Is there anything we do in church that you’re curious about? Please do ask because almost everything we do in church has a particular purpose.
