

COVID 19 UPDATE

YOU MUST NOT ATTEND if you are unwell, self isolating or showing any symptoms.

Baptisms, weddings and funerals continue with no numerical restrictions

A full risk assessment is in place and regularly revised. We continue stringent hygiene and social distancing procedures.

Face coverings are encouraged, especially when moving around the building and when the building is crowded. We will keep as much ventilation as possible.

Social Distancing is no longer mandated. Therefore, there is no general numerical restriction on attendance at any service, including baptisms, weddings, and funerals.

Everyone attending church is encouraged to use the whole building and to respect the space of others.

The central pews in the nave will return to full use. The side aisles will remain distanced for those who wish to remain distanced.

Hymns are now being sung.

You are encouraged to ensure that you are well spaced around the church. You may choose to wear a face covering when singing.

Please continue to leave your **collection** on the plate at the back of church. It will be presented at the offertory.

The peace may be shared physically amongst those who wish but please share only with those in your household. If you do not wish to share the peace physically, please wave the peace instead to indicate this!

Holy Communion continues to be received standing and using the one-way system still in place in church. You are encouraged to sanitise your hands before receiving.

Church of England guidance now permits receiving Holy Communion in both kinds (i.e. bread and wine) The chalice will be available for those who wish to receive it.

Where do we go from here?

Lester Amann considers the visit of the Wise Men.

Perhaps this was a question the Wise Men asked after seeing the infant Jesus. They had come from a distant land to Jerusalem. They had followed a star and expected to see a royal child. Now in Bethlehem, they saw things differently. No doubt, Mary and Joseph shared with these men their recent experiences and knew God was with them. Now the Magi had to have eyes of faith to recognise that this child was God in the flesh.

On 6th January many churches will celebrate Epiphany. On this day we remember the Eastern Men bringing their gifts to Jesus. The word 'epiphany' describes their 'revelation' or 'insight' that this was no ordinary baby. Who could they tell? Not King Herod. They had a dream warning them to return home a different way.

Their return to familiar surroundings was going to be different. They couldn't be silent about what they had experienced. Their lives were now changed. On returning home they faced new circumstances and challenges.

Doesn't this sound a bit familiar to us today? The Covid-19 pandemic has affected all of us in one way or another. Where do we go from here? We have celebrated our Lord's birth, but now we are returning to our previous activities. The festive break is over, and we are returning to changed, often difficult circumstances.

We go into a New Year that is so different from this time two years ago. While we might be downcast with all the upsets around us, there is one thing that has not changed. It is almighty God! He is our rock. We can look to Him in this world of confusion and uncertainty. Perhaps, from now on, we shall be worshipping and serving Him in different ways. So, with the challenges that lie ahead, let's continually seek His guidance.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding....and He will make your paths straight. (Proverbs 7:9-6)




A Green Christmas!




Our time in Stalybridge has brought some unexpected turns, and some good times! We have been very grateful to those who have supported and encouraged, especially during challenging times.

Stalybridge War Memorial Campaign



On Saturday 13th of November, a Remembrance Walk was organised by St. George's Church, Stalybridge. The group met at the Stalybridge War Memorial, where Frank Harrop pointed the expected position of the extension to the Stalybridge Memorial would be. The extension would contain the names the five casualties recognised as buried or commemorated at St. George's Church whose names are missing from the Stalybridge War Memorial. Then starting on the left of the memorial over to the right the names of all the remaining twenty casualties either buried within St. George's Churchyard or Commemorated there were pointed out. The walk then continued up to St. George's Churchyard where in a circular route the graves and commemorations discussed at the memorial were pointed out, including a brief history of each casualty.

Refreshments were served in church and there was opportunity to light a candle and remember the fallen in the peace of church whilst listening to Remembrance themed music and watching a slideshow of the men remembered in our churchyard.

We are very grateful to Mr Frank Harrop for all of his hard work and preparation for the event. Thank you to all who donated to the campaign for the extension to the memorial – a total of £53.20 was raised at St George's.




