# The Vicar writes...

There seems to be something in us which responds to the darker nights reflectively and encourages us to take stock; to look back and remember and then to look ahead, pray God, with hope in our lives, as well as in the life of the world.



We all know that it can be all too easy to forget. Sometimes the things we forget are trivial, sometimes they have significant consequences and sometimes they are the important things, an appointment, a birthday, an anniversary. We are all prone to forgetfulness at times and for different reasons, most often simply because we are human!

Remembering on the other hand is particularly special. We all know its nice to be remembered, it is a sign of respect, of love and care – a sign that we are significant someone's life or situation. Seeking to remember reminds us that although sometimes we all fail in the task, there is great significance and value in looking back, in learning, growing and recognising that we, and the world, are changed by what and who has gone before us. Remembering calls us to action – to be changed and shaped by the past that we might change and shape the future to be even better.

November is a particularly special month for remembering in church. 2nd November marks All Souls Day when we remember loved ones gone before us. Church of England guidance now permits receiving Holy Communion in both kinds (i.e. bread and wine) The chalice will be available for those who wish to receive it. **No intinction (dipping wafers).**

# On your marks, Cook Smart!

Chef Noel Goulding from Veterans Food Co. gave a cooking demonstration for the community at St George's Church, Stalybridge on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> October for the "On your marks, Cook Smart" session. The session was part of Malnutrition awareness week, (11-17<sup>th</sup> October). Tameside Council Population Health was busy throughout the week promoting good nutrition and hydration throughout life and into older age.



Those gathered thoroughly enjoyed Noel's entertaining and engaging style as they watched him prepare and good a butternut squash soup made with coconut milk and croutons, and a chickpea curry with rice. The food cost less than £10 and easily fed 15 people, with many going home with leftovers!

The session focused on batch cooking with foods that are good for the environment, with low food mileage for a positive impact for our climate. The group heard advice from Lauren Foster, part of the Population Health Team, on "food swaps" including staple ingredients like tinned lentils, chickpeas, butterbeans, tomatoes etc., which are great pantry items that last for a long time and save multiple trips to the shops, but also contain many nutrients, fibre, and protein and can be a great alternative which lasts longer, and is cheaper and healthier than meat, not to mention better for the environment.

The event brought us together in a fun and informal way, after many months of isolation. There was laughter and learning. Noel was so generous with his time and energy and has promised a return visit by popular demand – date to be confirmed! Watch this space...

#### The Active Service Testament Bible

The Active Service Testament Bible 1917 was issued to British troops during World War 1, between 1914—1915, and would have been carried into battle as part of their kit. The one below belongs to Margaret & Eric Dyson, and inside the front cover of this small, New Testament bible is a message to the troops from Lord Roberts. The message is dated 25<sup>th</sup> August 1914, less than a month after the war began.
